If I want to build my fence higher, how do I apply for a permit?

If your fence does not meet these standards, you must apply for a **development permit** requesting a variance to the Town's fence regulations. Here is what you need to apply for a development permit:


- Development permit application
- □ **Site plan** showing where the proposed fence will be located in relation to the property boundaries. We recommend using a Real Property Report or survey that may have been prepared on your property for your home.
- ☐ **Elevation drawing** or cross section showing the height, type, and style of the fence
- ☐ Certificate of title (current copy)
- ☐ **Application fees** (see current fee schedule)

☐ **Letters of Support** from all neighbours who may be affected by your fence.

It is important to note that your application for a variance will be considered by the Town relative to traffic safety standards, the overall impact on surrounding lots, and the concerns of adjacent property owners.

Things you need to know before building your fence

How high can I build my fence?

The maximum fence height allowed is 2.0 m (6.6 ft) for the portion of the fence that does not extend beyond the foremost portion of the building

The maximum fence height allowed is 1.0 m (3.3 ft) for the portion of a fence that does extend beyond the foremost portion of the building.

If you are fencing on a corner lot (abutting two streets), the maximum height is 1 m (3.3 ft.) for both the side and front yard abutting the street.


If your proposed fence does not meet these guidelines, you require a permit from the Town.

things you need to consider to prepare for the construction of your fence:

- □ Alberta One Call (800) 242 3447 must be contacted before you begin digging to locate all buried utilities.
- ☐ Locate your property
 lines using an Alberta Land
 Surveyor. A qualified Land
 Surveyor will stake out your
 property lines to ensure you
 are constructing your fence
 within your property.

- □ **Speak with your neighbours** as the location
 of the fence between two
 lots is at the discretion of
 the neighbours involved.
- □ Fence style is not directly regulated by the Town. However some materials, such as barbed wire, are not permitted.
- ☐ **Building permits** are not required except surrounding an outdoor pool. Contact the Town for more information.
